What is COPYRIGHT?

According to copyright.gov:
“Copyright is a form of protection grounded in the U.S. Constitution and granted by law for original works of authorship . . . (it) covers both published and unpublished works.”

Can I show a movie in my classroom?

“the performance or display of a work by instructors or pupils in the course of face-to-face teaching activities of a nonprofit educational institution, in a classroom or similar place devoted to instruction....” is permitted under copyright law 17 U.S.C. § 110(1)

Plagiarism
is taking someone else’s work and passing it off as one’s own without proper acknowledgment or documentation.

Free Online Pictures

To use someone else’s photo in your paper or presentation you

1. NEED PERMISSION and
2. MUST GIVE CREDIT TO THE SOURCE.

Photos labeled as ‘copyright free’ give you permission to use them.

Google will give you copyright free images, **IF you change the settings!** (In Google Images, click on Tools, then click the drop down arrow in Usage Rights. Choose ‘Labeled for Noncommercial Reuse.’)

When using information for a project, you must tell where you got that information. This is called citing your source.

There are special formats that should be used when citing sources, and there are websites that will help you format the information properly
